During the Middle Ages in Europe, a lord lived in a large castle and owned hundreds of acres of land. Besides his family, his own private army also lived on the property. The lord did not work the farm himself, but spent his time hunting, fighting, and eating.

The people who worked on the farm were called serfs. They lived on the land and were allowed to farm a small

<u>1</u> for themselves and their families. At least three days a week were spent <u>2</u> for the lord. The serfs weren't paid any money for this work, but were given limited farming privileges. A serf had to plow for the lord before he plowed his own land. He had to give the lord a percentage of his own grain when he <u>3</u> it. He had to give the lord a loaf of bread when he used the lord's oven for baking.

The serfs often found themselves in a situation where they could not afford to leave when they wanted to leave. More than that, they needed the lord's permission to leave. Serfs belonged to the lord just as the land did.
